


### **Director's Desk**

## **Heat Pump to Warm Shop**

The SA Operating Committee has secured partial funding for a heat pump to be a primary heat source allowing winter fiberglass work in our fleet maintenance shop. Prior to this, heat has been via a costly, oil burning furnace. Funding includes a grant from Efficiency Nova Scotia (\$3,439), a contribution from the Town of Shelburne (\$1,500) and the balance (\$1,361) from Sailing Academy funds. Access to the shop area has been a boon for fleet maintenance but it has come with considerable additional expense. We look forward to this new infrastructure to help reduce those costs.

### SA Graduate & Former Instructor **Awarded Female Sailor of the Year**

Breaking new ground is nothing new for Savannah Taylor. The long time Sailing Academy student, then instructor, has competed for years on the national and international stage. But in 2022, Savannah took her skills racing dinghies to a bigger boat, skippering Hard Eight, her dad's Tripp 41 at the 2022 Chester Race Week, winning her class, becoming Savannah Taylor



the youngest and the first female to do so and, in the process, winning Sail Nova Scotia's Female Sailor of the Year award. While suddenly in demand for offshore races, the plan for 2023 is to lead her crew on *Hard Eight* in the Marblehead to Halifax race, considered the preeminent North Atlantic ocean race. You can be sure all of SHYC will be watching and rooting her on. Congratulations, Savannah.

The SA Operating Committee is pleased to report approval of a \$5,000 Sport Fund grant as part of a \$12,500 equipment renewal and upgrade effort. This

effort includes acquiring five (5) new sail sets for our Albacore fleet to replace existing sails, one (1) new Opti spar, two (2) new Opti practice sails and two (2) Opti competition sails as well as two (2) new Opti dollies. The Academy has some up and coming young Opti competitors and it's part of our mission to support them with the best possible equipment to compete with.




# **Bursary Fund**



As noted in our recent report at the AGM, the Sailing Academy managed to finish 2022 with a relatively modest loss, a result made possible only because of a highly successful Ilca (Laser) Masters Atlantic Coast Championship (most of the green graph bars below). Staged for the benefit of the SA, the IMACC was made possible by the volunteer support of more than 45 SHYC members and the sponsorship support of a host of Shelburne businesses (see the June 2022 edition of the Jib Sheet at shyc.ca).
